

Students will use the Can-Have-Are chart to complete the writing page (3 options). You can direct them to choose a word or two from each section to write about rabbits. Then they can color the page.




EMERGENT READER

Students will color, cut, and staple together the emergent reader. Read it with them first, then have them practice reading on their own or with a partner.


Rabbits
